## Intro

The following stories fabulate an alternative future for the Ayluga wetlands in Famagusta, Cyprus. As well as contributing to the rich body of imaginaries in Famagusta, they aim to reflect my own journey of learning in this context. Through this process, I hope to share ideas about urban practice; drawing from a place facing issues that, while present elsewhere, often unfold with greater urgency.

Although created to retain water during the British colonial period, these wetlands now hold ecological and cultural importance.

They are valuable for common land and habitats locally, allongside ecological corridors on a broader scale. Despite this, and despite the illegality

of building there, the land around (and of) the lake is being developed at an alarming rate. This manifesto hopes to act as a counter imaginary to the poor quality, financialised development encroaching on this precious site.

These narratives follow a collective of those inhabiting the new developments who come together through shared vulnerabilities to develop interdependent and caring ways of relating; both each other and the wetlands. They explore how 'queer use' \* of landscape, space and culture can disrupt colonial, nationalist or capitalist

They ask how local communities can claim territories<sup>2</sup> and spatial agency<sup>3</sup> in opposition to destructive development approaches, how spaces can support speculative fabulation4 and radical imagination<sup>5</sup>, how they can meet housing demands in ways that are suited to earthly survival, and how they can live amongst the new structures - which are not going anywhere - in thriving ways.

Informing the stories and throughout the text, there are methodologies in green, connections to precedents in orange, contextual information in indigo, and theory and concepts in red.

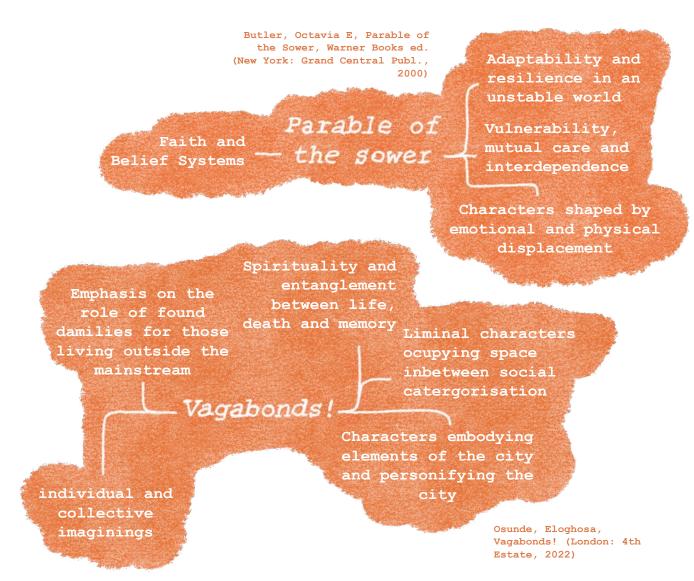
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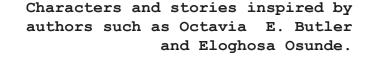

- She has a complicated relationship with time, appearing in stories and folktales across generations.

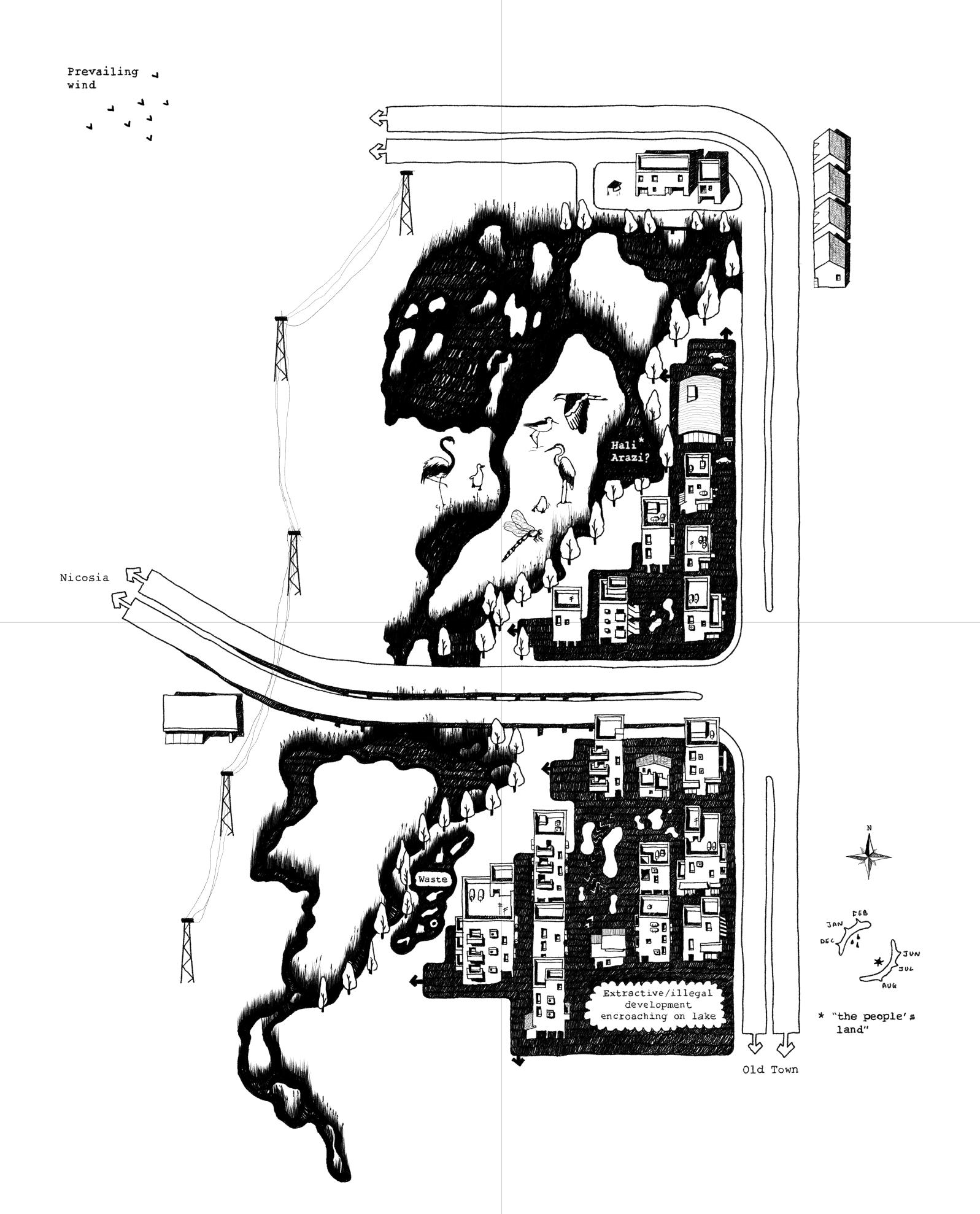
## Yasmin

I am Ayluga, I have always been ayluga, I always will be, even once it is gone...

I don't remember when they came. They dug the lakes, then planted the trees to reduce them, then cut down the trees to save the lakes. Some say they knew best... I know they loved to make things inside out. The buildings, inside out. Friendships, inside out.

This territory is hali arazi\*.. or, for now. It was. Before it is built on and diminished, built on and subdued, built on and vanished.

\*"Hali arazi": the peoples land



- Adara (Ada) Erythraea
- Adara: origins in Greek ('Adrasteia', a mythological figure representing inevitability and balance).
  - Ada: Means island, implying an island as a whole
- Erythraea: from the Greek word 'erythros,' refering to parts of the Red Sea and Indian Ocean.



- Architect turned builder with a Palestinian father and Cypriot mother displaced by historic conflicts
- Carries a sharp tongue and short patience, yet holds a profound love for people and their creativity.
- Ada dreams of creating a self-sustaining community around the lake.

## Ada

Ada often thought of the stories about communal ovens her grandparents had told. How the community came together, the collective joy and resillience they shared.

This building felt so far away from that. So separate and independent.

It had been a long summer and Ada felt like her flat was simmering.

Along with a few of her neighbors, she started to sit out in the gap between their building and the next. It was still hot, but they felt comfort from the occasional breeze and the shade of the buildings.

She sat out there every day. Drawing, dreaming and imagining.



She had not met everyone in the building before. Students came with reading, artists with making, children with playing. Even in the winter it had become a regular space to come to eat, to talk, to be.

During the British Colonial period, the planning rules were changed in Cyprus to force building in the middle of a square site rather than traditional courtyard typologies.

These rules are still followed, leading to large gaps between buildings.

There is no judgement in this space in-between, its an unspoken agreement to respect difference.

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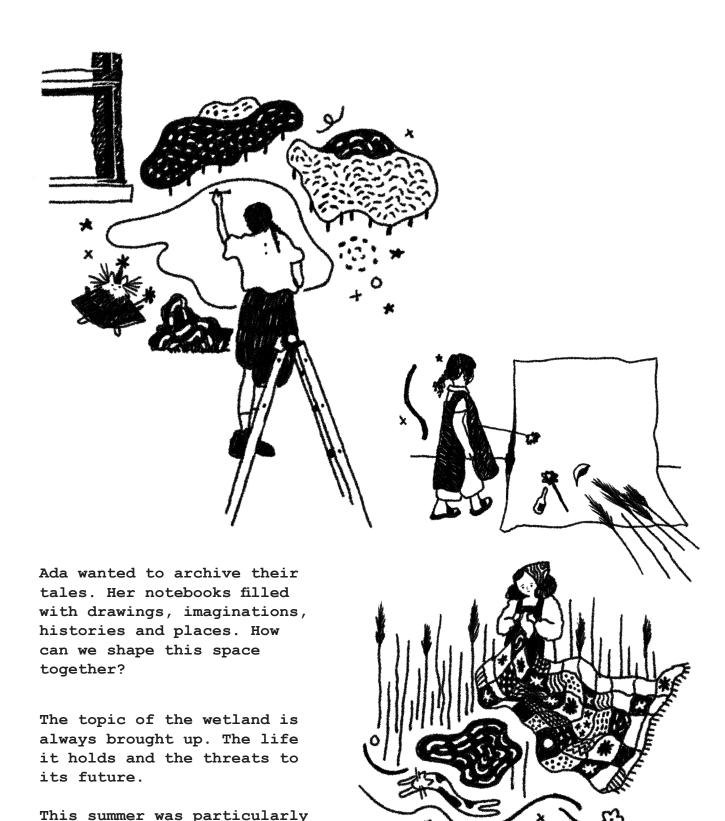


Figure 7, Photo of the Hope Room at Hope Street. Illustrating the calming materials, lighting and form. (Fotohaus Ltd. 2018)

They started making a walking route. Collecting artefacts of litter and plantlife to archive in the in-between space.

Some made lanterns from leaves and reeds. Imprinting stories of those that inhabit and depend on it. Made installations and follies with the waste that was constantly piling up.

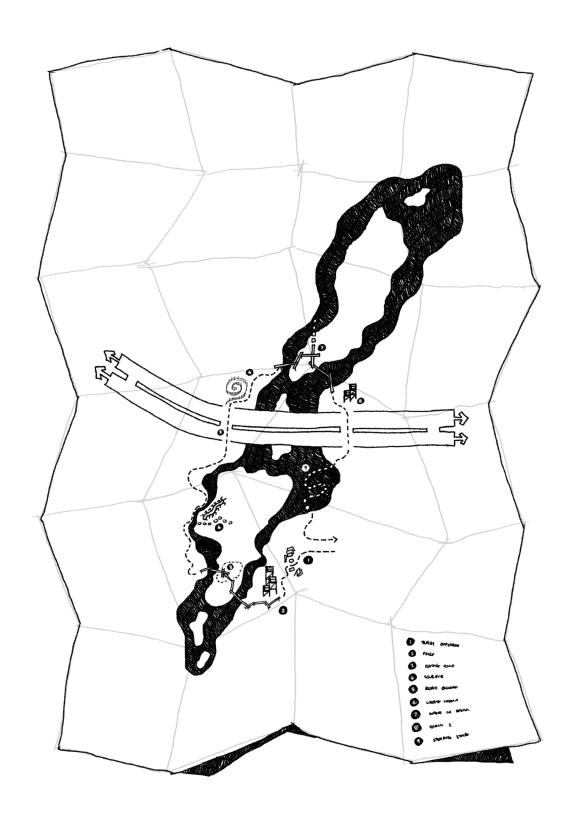

Due to its Geographic location between Europe and the Middle East, Cyprus often acts as a transitory point for people seeking sanctuary.

The location of this site, near the university in Famagusta, means that refugee students form a significant part of population growth.

## Yasmin

We receive visitors often. Travellers seeking a safe place to nest, voyagers seeking a safe place to rest, children of conflict seeking.. anywhere but there. Seeking a home.

It's, of course, a great opportunity for the greedy to make money. They build whether they own the land or not. endless terrible, shining and crumbling towers. None for affordable rates.

I can't see the future of Ayluga sometimes...

- Baran: Persian name meaning rain
- Mehri: Persian surname meaning kindness and compassion

- An ecology student studying micro-organisms in the lake.
- Radiating a quiet strength, Baran is sensitive to their surroundings and goes quiet when there's too much going on, often becoming distant and absorbed.
- Sought sanctuary in Famagusta through studying at the university
- Moved with their daughter, Nila, who formed an instant attachment to the wetlands.



## Baran

Baran attended a meeting to discuss the building where they live. Her neighbour, Ada, was adamant that it doesn't work. Way too hot in the summer and cold in the winter nights.

Not like the old town. Ada is always talking about courtyards with dripping water and shaded dead end streets.. the safety and community they support.

They talked about the vulnerability of their lives here. Unafordable heat in winter and air-conditioning in summer. Baran mentioned how inaccessible and hard to understand the systems were; how there was no space for care and maintenance planned in. How do we clean and repair the building? Where do we do laundry? Can we share appliances and tools?

How can we preserve rain water? How can we use waste water?

Thinking of Nila, Baran raised the lack of play and education spaces nearby. How far away her overcrowded school is.

The walled city in Famagusta exhibits traditional building Cyprus.

The dead-end streets and courtyards, as well as sheltering from the sun, provide layers of privacy/intimacy.

This allows for a level of community and interdependency which is less encouraged in the recent, sprawling highrises.

Over the next few evenings, they worked together to reimagine the building. Adding spaces for them to share and spaces for the whole neighbourhood to use. They discussed how they could acquire the building in the future. How can we build new economies of solidarity and interdependence?



Some explored how to use the waste materials around. How they can shelter, shade and ventilate. How to craft beautiful courtyards and dead-end streets in these concrete and steel monoliths

Baran enjoyed an afternoon preparing a meal with Ada.

They talked through their story - like many in the area - having to leave their home country with nila, coming to Famagusta for the university.

How hard it was to explain why they had to leave. Why her mother couldn't come...

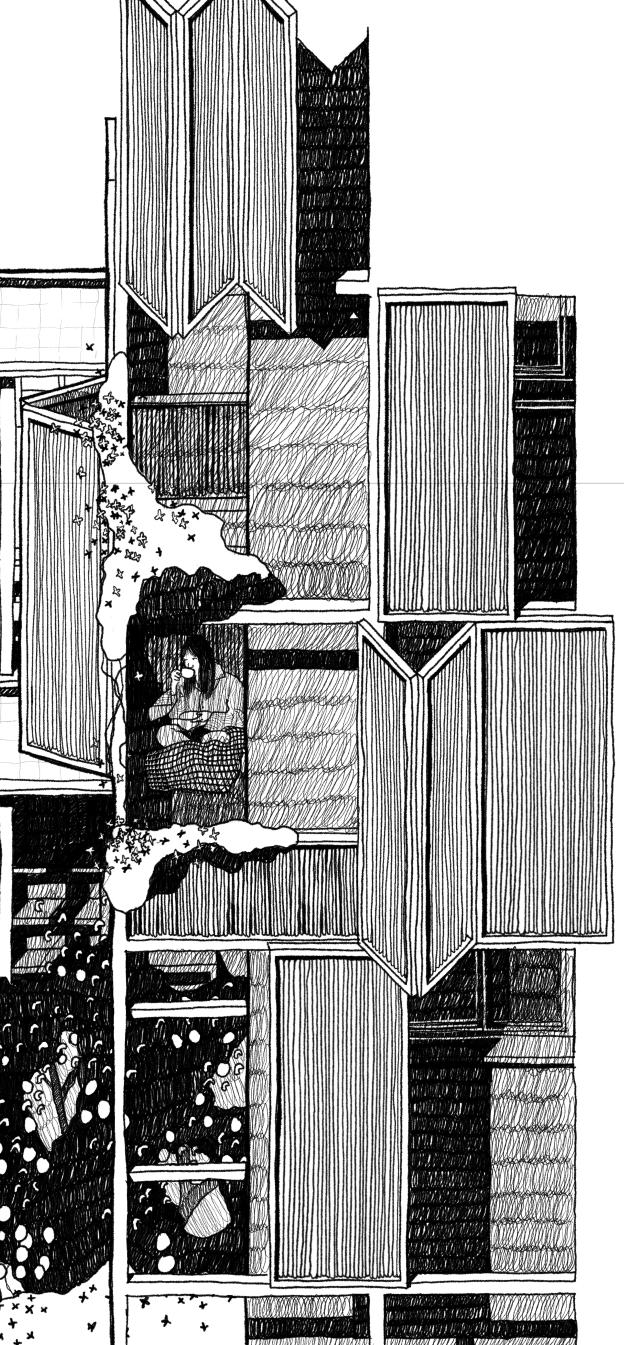

## Maz

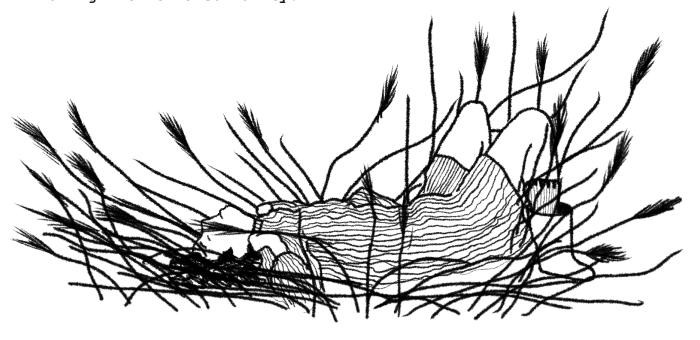
Maz had herd about a Space in the gaps. A place where you can go and nobody asks why. Where you can stay and work and be. It stuck in her mind.

Spending time there, the journey took her into the Ayluga wetlands. The people she met saw the landscape, along with every tree, bird and insect - each invisible bacteria - as one of them.

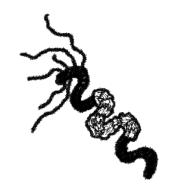
## Yasmin

Children love Ayluga. They understand those that inhabit it more than adults. They have a curiosity that hasnt been styfled.

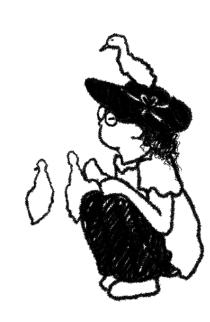
Theyre not wary of 'that wont happen here'..

- Facinated by wildlife, she makes crafty homes for critters and spirits out of waste.
- Drawing her sensitivity from Baran, Nila has an overwhelming ability to put people at ease.
- She has an imaginary friend called Parisa, who lives in the lake and works with others to keep it healthy.

We followed it through the compost garden and the crops growing tall.

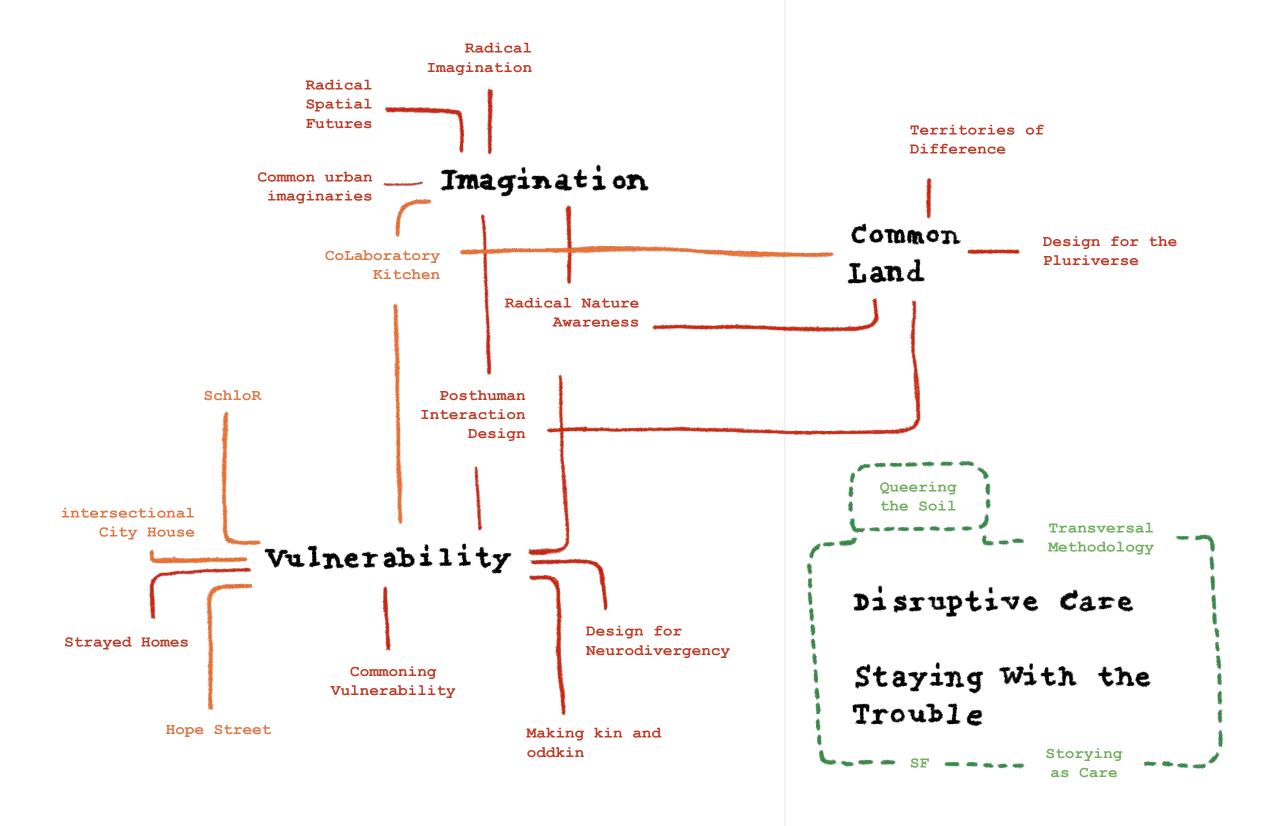
